- 2 Fully accessible buildings and appliances.
- **3** Located in low-traffic, safe areas.

How to Rent to Veterans through HUD-VASH and SSVF

1 Get Familiar with the Program:

The Housing and Urban Development-Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (HUD-VASH) combines HUD's <u>Housing Choice Voucher</u> rental assistance with VA case management and supportive services. Similarly, <u>Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF)</u> offers awards grants to community-based nonprofit organizations, to offer rapid housing or re-housing to Veterans facing homelessness. These organizations provide short-term interventions such as security deposits, rental subsidies, housing case management, and financial assistance to support the Veteran in assuming full responsibility for the lease and rent.

Confirm Property Standards:

Properties must pass <u>HUD's NSPIRE standards for inspection</u> including working smoke alarms, proper ventilation, connected utilities, functional appliances, secure windows and doors, and no hazards.

- Submit Your Unit:
 Fill out the VA Landlord Contact Form to list your available units.
- Screen and Lease:
 Screen eligible Veterans and finalize lease agreements. Initial lease terms are typically 12 months.
